St. Paul wrote to the Church of Christ in Corinth: "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor 9:7). God loves a cheerful giver. But who is a cheerful giver?

Abel was. By faith, Abel gave the firstborn of his flock, and it was acceptable in God's sight. Abraham was. By faith, Abraham prepared cakes and a tender choice calf for God and entertained angels unaware. So also were David and Solomon. By faith, David would not make a sacrifice to God that cost him nothing, so he paid Araunah his due. By faith, Solomon built a house for God, where his name would dwell and thereby where He would dwell to be Israel's God and they His people.

What more shall I say? For time would fail me to tell of all those who gave not simply for the joy of giving but for the joy of knowing the One to whom they gave.

So also our Lord, who for the joy set before Him, gave everything, yes, even His life, enduring the cross and scorning its shame. He gave to the shedding of His blood, willingly and resolutely setting His face toward Jerusalem to die for the life of the world. Though He was rich in every way, He became poor, so that by His poverty we might be rich beyond measure.

So then, let us – like Abel and Abraham, like David and Solomon, and even like our Lord Jesus Christ – give cheerfully to God for the work of His kingdom in our midst. Like them, let us decide in our heart – for the joy set before us – the joy of knowing the One to whom we give is the One who gives us all good things.

More from the Pastor's Pen

On Monday, September 31, I arrived at the church office like I normally do. Our computer guy, Farren, was sitting at my desk, checking out my computer. (It had stopped working on Saturday and I called him in a panic.) He confirmed that the mother board had died, but he would have to check to see if my hard drive had also died. (The hard drive has all my files on it.)

After Farren left my office, Jean wanted to talk. She told me that she would be retiring at the end of the month.

After Jean, it was Charity's turn. She had received a call to Tallmadge Lutheran Church. Tallmadge is a suburb of Cleveland, OH. She and Jesse would visit the church the following week, and then she would spend some time deliberating on where the Lord would want her to serve.

It was quite a Monday morning, and it wasn't even lunch time yet. But to be honest, I wasn't panicked. I couldn't work on my computer, so any computer related items were simply not possible. I figured we had a month to find Jean's replacement and get that person trained, but I also knew that the council would need to be the ones to take the lead on that, so I texted our congregational President and encouraged that he move ahead. And with Charity, I figured it was out of my hands. The Lord will guide the process, and He would do what is best for all involved.

Well, the council posted the office coordinator's job on a website, and we had 43 applicants within a day or two. We decided we had enough applicants and decided to close the posting. Charity, Laurie (our ELC Director), and I looked at the resumes and wrote comments on each one. Chari Manry, our Church Council Secretary, then went through them and picked out the top three candidates. The candidates interviewed with Chari, Walt Fick (our Council's Vice President), Charity, and me. All three candidates did well, and it was a close decision, but our top choice was Sue Wells. She was hired. Her first day was on October 21 and she has been training with Jean since then.

Jean has been a wonderful blessing to the church. Not only does she fulfill her job description, she does so much more. She interacts with visitors at church on Sunday. She proof reads my articles and letters. She pulls weeds. She interprets the church constitution and continually checks it to make sure we are following it. She will be missed. To date, "Jean's Greens", an account that has been set up in Jean's honor and will be used to landscape and beautify our new property, has now brought in over \$1400. (If you would like to contribute to it, please make a check out to St. Luke's and put "Jean's Greens" in the memo line.)

On Saturday and Sunday (October 26-27), Charity announced that she had declined the call to Tallmadge. Before she did, I thought of some of the things she has done in the last 7 years here at St. Luke's. She has started Lighthouse (a support group for those suffering through the heartbreak of miscarriage and infertility). She has brought Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University (FPU) to St. Luke's. (Both the Lighthouse Group and FPU fall in line with Family Life Ministry activities.) She has been involved in the Early Learning Center, sharing chapel and Bible time responsibilities with me. She has been instrumental in combining the Meet the Teacher event with Rally Day. She has worked with our members to put on our Back to School Bash. She has been a key figure in BASIC Training (our Wednesday night education program) and Sunday School. She started a Jr. High Youth ministry. She has been a key figure in making sure our youth have raised enough money to get to the National Youth Gathering, District Gatherings, and Quake. She has found willing people

to serve on boards, and then worked with those boards to make decisions and implement policies. She has been a warm, friendly greeter in the narthex, both before and after the worship services.

If the Lord would have led Charity to leave St. Luke's to go to Tallmadge, I would have been sad. We would have had a time of transition, but we would have made it through. But, I'm grateful that we don't have to do that. Charity has been a blessing to St. Luke's, and I'm grateful that she will continue to be.

And just to wrap up the loose ends in this little story, Farren discovered that my hard drive was not damaged. I didn't lose my files. He put my hard drive into a loaner computer, and I, once again, was working on a computer on Thursday, October 3.

Alzheimer's disease is an irreversible, progressive brain disorder that slowly destroys memory and thinking skills, and, eventually, the ability to carry out the simplest tasks. In most people with Alzheimer's, symptoms first appear in their mid-60s. Estimates vary, but experts suggest that more than 5.5 million Americans, most of them age 65 or older, may have dementia caused by Alzheimer's.

Scientists don't yet fully understand what causes Alzheimer's disease. In its early stages, memory loss is mild, but with late-stage Alzheimer's, individuals lose the ability to carry on a conversation and respond to their environment.
