The **DCE Call Committee** has been working diligently.

The committee members are Chari Manry (Committee Chair, former Church Council Secretary), Julie Thiele (former Preschool Chair), Tiffany Manning (Children's Ministry Chair), Natalie Winter (Youth Chair), Jessica Jones (Campus Ministry Chair), Shane Rengstorf (Elder), Jim Jenkins (Member), and myself.

The committee first created a job description that was embraced by the council. - The Bible is the Word of God and is taught in all of its truth and purity.
- Using the Small Catechism children are taught to love God and serve their neighbor.

Jr. Confirmation is aimed at 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders. (Students are also called catechumens, because they study the catechism). We do a deep dive into Luther's Small Catechism, studying its 6 chief parts over a 2-year period. We also ask our confirmands to play the chimes, participate in worship, serve as an acolyte, and get connected to the other confirmands in the class. Parents are invited to join their child in class. At the end of the 2-year period, the confirmands *confirm* that the faith into which they were baptized is their personal faith. The Rite of Confirmation is on Palm Sunday. Is your child starting the 7<sup>th</sup> grade? Please strive to have them be part of our class.

**Stewardship in the First Commandment**

The greatest gift that Martin Luther gave to us was his Small Catechism. The word “enchiridion” is part of the original title of this work. This is the Greek word for “handbook.” The Small Catechism is a handbook of the Bible. All the basic knowledge that a Christian needs to understand the faith and live a godly life has been taken from the Bible and distilled into this beautiful little book of Christian piety.

Luther starts with the Ten Commandments.

The First Commandment:

You shall have no other gods.

*What does this mean?* We should fear, love, and trust in God above all things. (SC I)

We have a God above us. He is the Lord God and we are not. He is Almighty and in control. He is righteous and good. And therefore, we should fear Him.

This God is also our heavenly Father. He wants us to be saved. He does not want us to suffer His just wrath. He has provided salvation for us in His Son, Jesus Christ. And therefore, we should love Him.

Our heavenly Father will never leave us nor forsake us. He has promised as much — and the Bible shows us that He always keeps His promises. So, we should trust Him.

In the Large Catechism, Luther explains how money and possessions form one of the greatest temptations against the First Commandment:

This I must unfold somewhat more plainly, that it may be understood and perceived by ordinary examples of the contrary. Many a one thinks that he has God and everything in abundance when he has money and possessions; he trusts in them and boasts of them with such firmness and assurance as to care for no one. Lo, such a man also has a god, Mammon by name, i.e., money and possessions, on which he sets all his heart, and which is also the most common idol on earth. He who has money and possessions feels secure, and is joyful and undismayed as though he were sitting in the midst of Paradise. On the other hand, he who has none doubts and is despondent, as though he knew of no God. For very few are to be found who are of good cheer, and who neither mourn nor complain if they have not Mammon. This [care and desire for money] sticks and clings to our nature, even to the grave. (LC I 5–9)

These words of Dr. Luther should call us to repentance; sometimes, we live and act like we don't have a Father in heaven. We seek our comfort and peace outside of His gracious promises. But we do have a Father in heaven. He does love us. All His promises are true. And the Lord will surely provide. If that is our belief, then our outward lives will reflect our belief in our acts of generosity and mercy. We will see money and possessions not as gods but rather as tools for doing God's work.

## **My Impressions of the Conference Of the Consortium of Classical Lutheran Education**

I've been to literally hundreds of conferences in my lifetime, all pretty much the same: plenary sessions (only share what works, please), breakout sessions, meals with people you don't know around a clothed-covered table with cloth napkins. Then there are the vendor-sponsored wine and hors d'oeuvres in the early evening and the stand-up breakfast if you get there early enough. And don't forget the up-scale dress code and your best manners.

Boy, was I in for a culture shock when I attended the 2023 Conference of the Consortium of Classical Education (CCLE)! A very wonderful culture shock. Here's a typical day. We leave our dorm room in time to get to Matins in the chapel. The children (yup, LOTS of children) are dismissed to go to Jesus day camp. The plenary is delivered by someone who has been working in or with a classical Lutheran school for quite some time. Lots of wisdom there. The breakout sessions run the gamut from teaching methods to philosophical underpinnings. At lunch parents pick up their children and we all head to the dining hall: pick up a tray and plastic fork and help yourself. Back to work after another plenary. To find your breakout you pass by the vendors who hand out candy (chocolate is my preference). Afternoon is capped off with Vespers. After dinner-on-your-own you attend Compline. As for the dress code it's primarily jeans or clerical collar.

But I've omitted the most important stuff. I haven't told you about the joy, exuberance, and "brotherly" affection. No one there was someone you didn't know. In fact, they knew you so well they offered to help you out no matter the stage of development of your school. Five hundred people represented churches like ours -in a research phase-, or those switching from established Lutheran to Classical Lutheran, or those that had been classical for many years. Lots of wisdom there, too.

Lots of knowledge and experience as well, from veteran classroom teachers to long-time principals and pastors, to authors of widely-read books on their topics, to those who consult with congregations professionally. They were, to a person, willing to share expertise and experience on a one-to-one basis. Their desire to share their ups **and** downs was astounding! No hiding the pitfalls. Families' knowledge of the Bible, the various Lutheran liturgies, hymnody, doctrine, creeds and confessions was impressive. During services we were one big Lutheran family praising and worshiping our heavenly Father. As it should be!

### **A couple of brief thoughts**

**Dr. Gene Edward Veith, keynote speaker and author of *Classical Education: The Movement Sweeping America***, notes that Classical education combines the Liberal Arts with Lutheran catechesis, and says "The liberal arts can equip a child for effective service in the world; catechesis can equip a child for everlasting life." Who doesn't want these for their child?

Kate Deddens and Leah Broman are consultants. They believe, "Classical Lutheran Education cultivates the human spirit. While everything about being human is being dismantled, we are rebuilding. We must rearticulate, reclaim, collaborate, and build classical Lutheran education that energizes us and our families toward Truth, Goodness, and Beauty found in our Savior, Jesus Christ. Our Lutheran faith and traditions offer depth and distinction amid widespread cultural deprivation, ..."

## The History of Our Jesus Statue

Several people have wondered about the significance of the statue of Jesus residing on a ledge on the right side of the sanctuary. Why was it put there? Where did it originate? And more.

The Ladies Bible Study Group held a discussion about the statue one morning. Two of our members had grown up in St. Luke's from childhood, and they filled us in on the history. Once we all learned more about it, we thought it would be worth putting an article in The Visitor, so that others could know the background and perhaps have a better appreciation of the statue.

After looking through papers regarding the history of our congregation, the following was learned. The original church building was on Osage St. and built in 1923. St. Luke's was organized and accepted into the Synod in October of 1925.

The religious figure of Jesus we have now was the centerpiece of the altar at the Osage St. church. When the Sunset Ave. church was built in the early fifties, the new altar did not include the statue. Instead, it was placed in the church Fellowship Hall where the children went to Sunday School. A platform had been made to use as a small altar and placed at the far end of the Fellowship Hall for the opening worship time. The Jesus statue was centered on the platform with candles on either side, and the children took turns lighting the candles. The small altar with the statue in the center must have given a special meaning to these young ones.

The Education Building was dedicated in 1961. The children had the Opening Session each Sunday before dividing into individual classes with the Jesus statue once again as a focal point. Next, the Jesus statue was moved to the landing of the Education Building stairway. Everyone who walked up the stairs had a full view of the spiritual figure.

When we moved to our present location in July of 2020, the Jesus statue came with us. He was not put in a store room, but placed in a visual spot. The statue has been painted more than once over the years. The next time you worship at St. Luke's, you'll know the history and may have a greater appreciation. The statue is a symbol of our faith and what Jesus has taught us.
