#### From The Pastor's Pen

On October 31, Lutherans celebrate the Reformation! Here are some of the key points that we celebrate with the Reformation.

### Scripture / Bible / The Word of God

Some of our rules for interpreting the Bible are as follows:

- The Word of God is **authoritative**. We are under the Word of God, not over it. We do not have the authority to overrule it because we don't like what it says.
- **⋄** Scripture interprets Scripture.
  - It's not Scripture and Tradition.
  - It's not Scripture and sound reason.
  - When Scripture speaks, we speak. When Scripture is silent, so are we.
- - The Law makes demands of us, and condemns us when those demands are not met.
  - The Gospel is God's gifts and promises.
- ♦ **Jesus** is the key to interpreting the Bible. It's about HIM, and His work to save us.

#### Justification

- We are saved by grace through faith in Christ.
- We are not saved by faith and works.
- ♦ Works flow from faith.

#### Office of the Holy Ministry (a.k.a. Office of the Public Ministry/Office of the Keys)

- ♦ The Office of the Holy Ministry was instituted by Christ.
- The Office is found within the church.
- ♦ The Office delivers the forgiveness of sins through Word and Sacrament.

#### Sacraments

- The Sacraments are Baptism and the Lord's Supper.
- The Sacraments deliver the forgiveness of sins wrapped in physical elements.

#### Repentance

- Repentance is not a work that we do.
- Repentance is both contrition and faith.
  - Contrition is worked by the Law. In the Smalcald Articles (1537), Luther referred to contrition as *passive* contrition because it is worked in us by God.
  - Faith is created by the Holy Spirit through the Gospel.
    - \* Faith is not a decision. Because of our sinful nature, we don't have the ability to invite Christ into our hearts.
    - \* Faith is not limited by our cognitive ability.
    - \* Faith is a **gift** from God that trusts in Jesus for salvation.
    - \* Faith believes and speaks what is from God.

#### Single Predestination

- - ◆ God gets the credit: People are saved because God has elected them to be saved and blesses them with faith in Jesus.
  - We get the blame: People are condemned to hell because they have rejected Jesus as the Savior.

#### Vocation

- Vocations are those roles in life that God has given us to carry out.
- One is not more God-pleasing than another.
- Theocentric, not Anthropocentric
  - Sound theology has God at the center.
  - Our unity with others flows from being connected to God.

As we celebrate the Reformation, we celebrate these key points that our Lutheran heritage has delivered to us.

We will be celebrating the Reformation the last weekend of October in church, but our Circuit will also be having a **Reformation Service** and **Presentation** on **Sunday**, **October 29**, **2:00-4:30 p.m.**, at **St. John Lutheran Church** in **Alma**. The preacher and presenter will be **Rev. Dr. Jon Bruss**. He is a former pastor at St. John in Topeka and is now an Associate Professor of Systematic Theology at Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne. The topic of his presentation will be: "The Seal of the Confessional: History and Contemporary Challenges."

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#### **EARLY LEARNING CENTERN (ELC)**



It's in the Way that You Use It

Consider the humble baseball bat. It is a simple tool designed for a complex task. The batter needs a tool that can consistently deliver force to a small ball which may be thrown at over 100 miles per hour, but which might also come slanting across the plate as a slow curve. For a game like this, the founders of baseball had to redesign the old cricket bat, which is more of a flat paddle. The tool had to fit the job.

But even a specially-designed tool can be used for a different purpose. It turns out that some years ago in England, the home of cricket, baseball bats suddenly started selling like hotcakes. What were folks across the pond doing with all those baseball bats? Using them as clubs in riots!

A tool can be used, and it can be misused. It's all in the way that you use it.

The same is true with the things of God. The Second Commandment states that we should "not misuse the name of the Lord." In the Small Catechism, Luther goes on to tell us exactly what this misuse is, as well as the proper use:

"We should fear and love God so that we do not curse, swear, use satanic arts, lie, or deceive by His name, but call upon it in every trouble, pray, praise, and give thanks." (SC I)

The Lord has given us His name: He has placed it upon us in Holy Baptism and He has invited us to pray to Him as our Father. In this sense, the Lord's name is something for us to use. We should not misuse it ... and we should not fail to use it. The Pharisees of old were so afraid of misusing the name of God that they decided to simply never say the name of God (YHWH, Jehovah) at all! This non-use is just as bad as misuse. The Lord gives His gifts for our use.

A Christian steward is one who is called to use all of God's gifts for His purposes. This includes things like the Name of God, the Sacraments and the Word, and it also includes things like our family and friends, our talents and skills, our money and resources. Everything that God has given to you, He has given to you so that you may be blessed to use it for His kingdom. It's all in the way that you use it!


### What is a Qualified Charitable Contribution (QCD)?

A QCD is a withdrawal from a traditional IRA which goes directly to a qualified charity. If done correctly this withdrawal and contribution does not add to Federal or State Taxable Income or Adjusted Gross Income. You do not have to itemize on taxes to take advantage of this giving opportunity.

#### The basic requirements are:

- 1) The withdrawal must be from a Traditional Individual Retirement Account (IRA). (If you have a 401K or 403 B funds can be rolled to a traditional IRA first to make this work.)
- 2) The IRA owner must be at least 70.5 years old.
- 3) The money must go directly to a qualified charity. St. Luke's is qualified. The recommended approach is to have the check made out to St. Luke's Lutheran Church and have it mailed to you and you deliver. Make a copy of the check and deliver to St. Luke's so you know all was done correctly.
- 4) When reporting taxes, the withdrawal is reported and if the QCD options are appropriately load and calculated on your tax forms this withdrawal will not be a taxable event..
- 5) If you are of the age of Required Minimum Distribtuions (RMD) the QCD can count towards your RMD requirements. (The RMD age is changing from 70.5 top 72 years of age depending on your age.)
- 6) The maximum qualified QCD is \$100,000 per year per individual. IRA's are individually owned. So if each spouse has their own IRA, each can do a QCD.

#### A Well-Cooked Education: The Nourishing Wisdom of Classical Education

Home cooking, characterized by its careful selection of ingredients, appropriate use of kitchen tools, and focus on beloved, tried-and-true recipes, mirrors the essence of a classical education. In a classical education, students are not mere recipients of facts and figures; they are participants in a grand narrative that weaves through history, literature, and language. This narrative whispers tales of heroism and folly, of love and loss, resonating with the heartbeat of humanity. These are the primary ingredients that compose a well-crafted dish. The embrace of these carefully selected ingredients is the essence of foundational knowledge, fostering an unshakable foundation upon which to build a life of purpose and meaning.

Additionally, just as a home chef uses time-tested techniques to create their dish, a classical education equips individuals with timeless intellectual tools. Most importantly, a Classical Education begins with profound questions echoing through time: "What is Man?" and "What is the Purpose of Man?"
