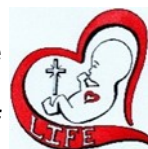

We are boldly and unapologetically pro-life.

St. Luke's is a congregation of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS). We believe that abortion is contrary to God's Word and "is not a moral option, except as a tragically unavoidable byproduct of medical procedures necessary to prevent the death of another human being, viz., the mother" (1979 Res. 3-02A).



This is a controversial topic in our society. Not many people enjoy controversy, but we are also aware that if we are not permitted to state what we believe, people will not know what we believe. With this in mind, I want to share with you over the next few of months how you might respond to pro-abortion arguments.

When someone says “Strop forcing your religion on women,” we could respond:

You don't have to be religious to recognize that life begins at conception. According to a 2018 academic study by University of Chicago researcher Dr. Steven Jacobs, 95% of biologists (including supermajorities of scientists who self-identify as “pro-choice” or “liberal”) affirm that life begins at fertilization. Our existence is a result of conception, and conception always results in a baby. At the moment of fertilization, a single, unique, unrepeatable, living human being is created. How do we know it's living? The embryo is constantly growing as cell division takes place, and its processing nutrition; neither of these biological processes happen when something is nonliving. How do we know it's human? A preborn child has a human genome – twenty-three pairs of distinctly human chromosomes composed of uniquely human DNA. A living creature cannot transform into a different species. A simple change in location from the womb into the outside world cannot turn a nonhuman creature into a human being.

Even if you deny science, our society claims to recognize the inherent value of a person's life. You see this manifest when we fight racism, sexism, or any other form of discrimination. If all life is *not* valuable, who gets to decide who deserves to live or die? Dehumanization has historically led to violence. Regardless of what religion we practice, we should be protecting the lives of the innocent and defenseless.

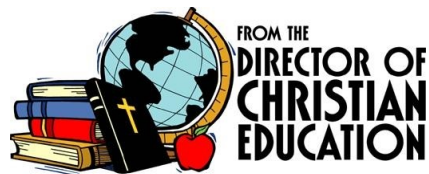

Whose Is It Anyway?

If you have ever bought or sold a house, you are acquainted with the concept of a “title search.” Before you can sell your house, and before anyone else will feel comfortable putting down the money to buy it, you have to prove that you really own it. So a title company looks through the public records to ensure that you bought it from the person who really owned it, who bought it from the person who really owned it before that, all the way back to the earliest records of your state, including when your state was only a territory or colony of England.

Peak into a preschool classroom during playtime and you’ll see a simplified version of this. A child starts playing with a ball, but another child says, “That’s mine: I had it first.”

You can’t understand the Seventh Commandment without understanding this concept of ownership or title. As the Small Catechism puts it:

You shall not steal. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor’s money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income.

Your neighbor’s possessions are *his*: you don’t have a right to take them. And likewise, your possessions are yours. Ownership and property rights are foundational to any functioning society.

But there is something deeper to know about ownership, and that is the question of who has the title and ownership *to you*? Paul says, “Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price” (1 Cor. 6:19–20).

If you yourself are owned by God, then of course everything that you own, you really only possess by God’s leave: all of it, at bottom, belongs to Him since *you* belong to Him. For you were bought with the blood of Christ.

This notion is the foundation of all Christian stewardship. It all belongs to God. It should all be used for things that bring honor to His name, blessings to our neighbors and the extension of His kingdom.

GROWING OUR LEGACY – 100 YEAR CELEBRATION

Let's take a moment today to ponder our church's history. To think about how the members were looking forward and asking themselves, what can we sacrifice for the sake of the ministry?

Were they thinking of establishing a church for just it's members? Or was it a broader vision to consider building a legacy that would enable this church to stand, grow and support a larger ministry within this community? What do you think?

Looking back at the church's history has been an interesting process for our committee. We can only imagine what was going through their minds about establishing this church. We have compiled a few notes of interest from those first years.

- The members had \$137.39 in their building fund when they began raising money for the Osage church building.
- The Osage church was built for \$4,760 in 1923 with no debt. Many members provided skilled labor to save on costs.
- Five years later the Osage parsonage was built for \$4,300 in 1928. Again, skilled labor saved on the costs.
- Pastor Frohr's annual salary in 1928 was \$807.50.
- There were 47 communicant members in 1927.

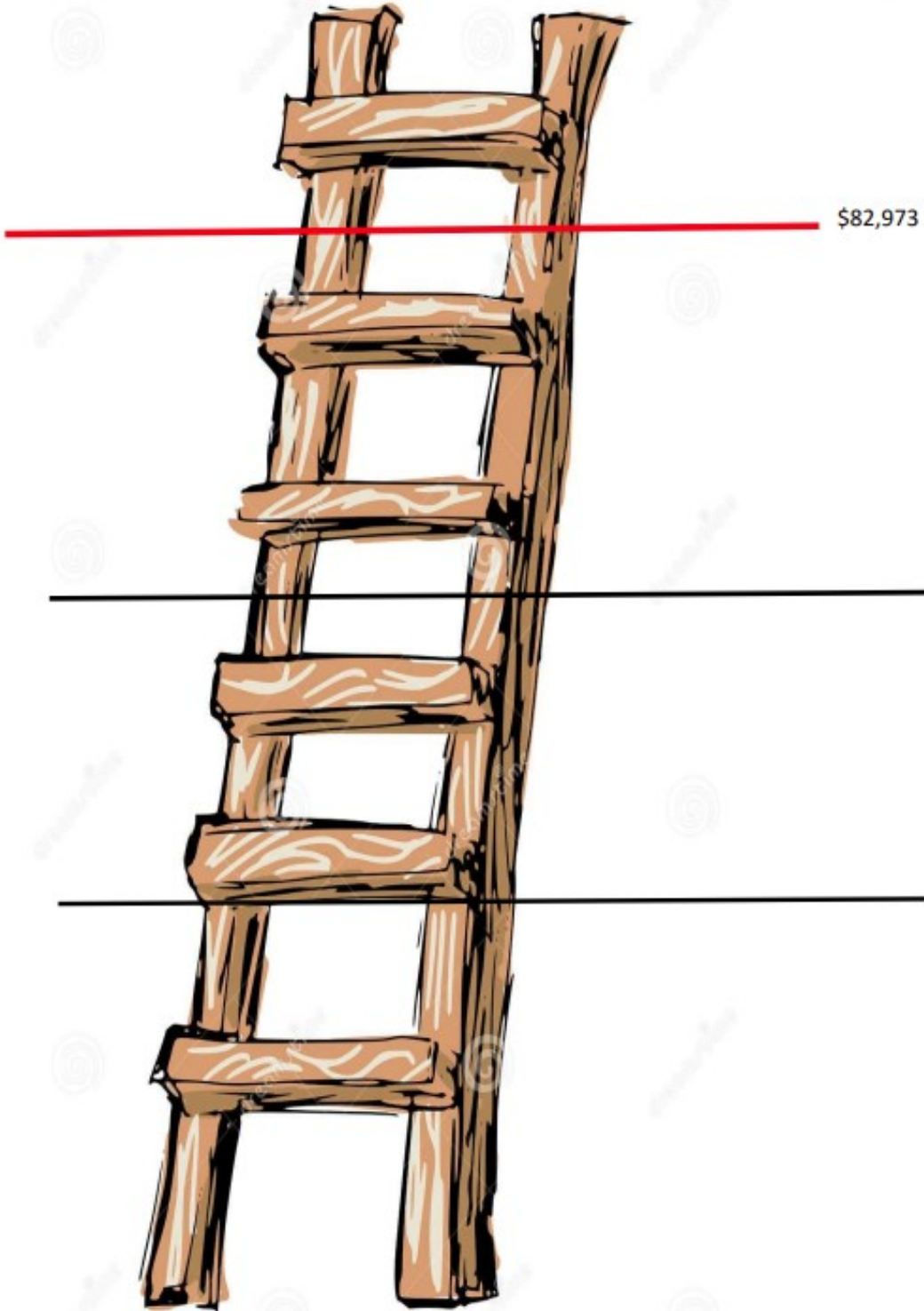

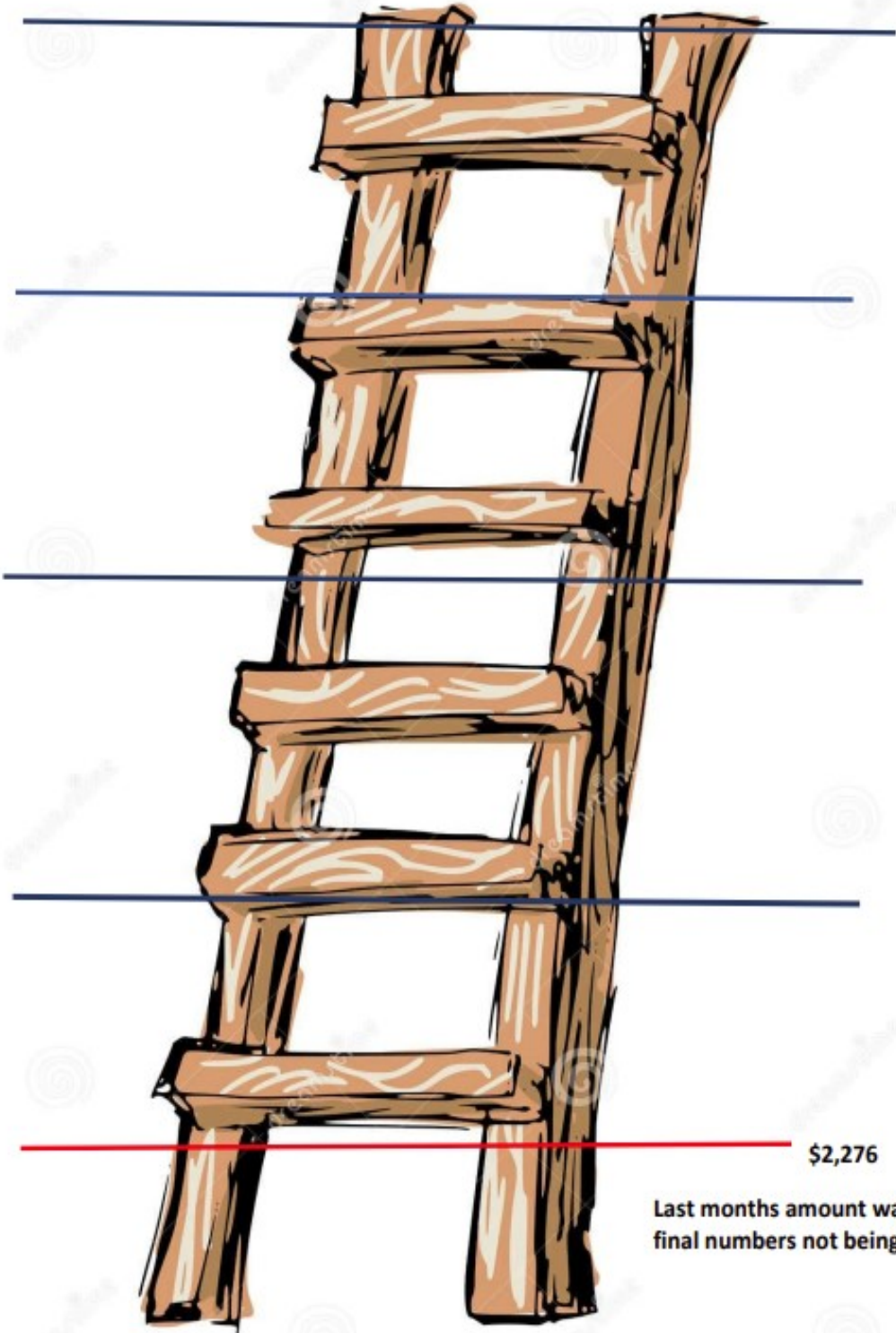

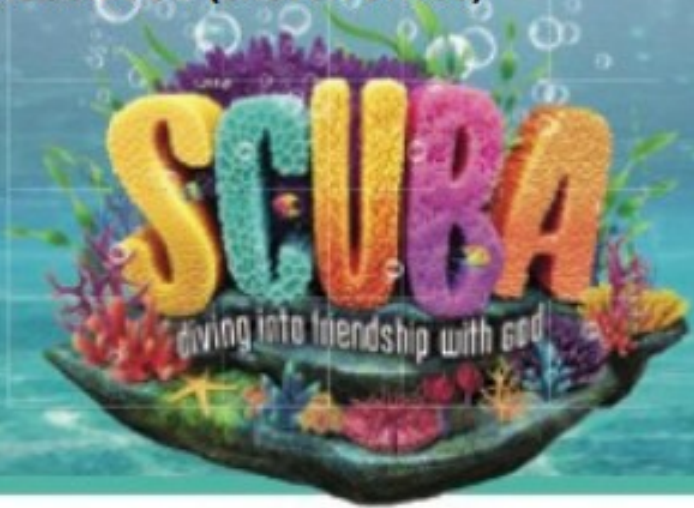
