### From The Pastor's Pen

17 Though the fig tree should not blossom, nor fruit be on the vines, the produce of the olive fail and the fields yield no food, the flock be cut off from the fold and there be no herd in the stalls, 18 yet I will rejoice in the Lord; I will take joy in the God of my salvation. Habakkuk 3:17-18

Habakkuk was a prophet. He heard things from God, and shared it with others. Most prophets spent their time getting God's message to the Israelites. But Habakkuk was a little different, because he talked to God instead of the Israelites.

Habakkuk asked a lot of questions of the Lord.

- He wondered why so many bad things were happening to God's people.
- He wondered why people didn't love their neighbors as themselves.
- He wondered why people disobeyed God.
- He wondered what God was going to do about this.

God wants us to ask Him questions. He wants us to know Him better. God answered Habakkuk. He said that He knows everything that happens, no matter how big or small. He saw his people's pain, and He had a plan to fix it.

Habakkuk was a little confused about God's plan, so he asked Him even more questions.

- He wondered how God's people would be able to overcome their enemies.
- He wondered how God could turn bad things into good.

God said that even though it might not happen in a way that Habakkuk expected, He would always keep his promises, and he would make things right in the end. But first, Habakkuk had to trust God ... and be patient.

Habakkuk started to understand what God was saying. He had to trust that God knows what's best for us. And God always does what He'll say He'll do. After that, Habakkuk praised God for His goodness. He hoped that God would continue to bless His people like He had done in the past. Habakkuk proclaimed that he would put his hope in God's promises from now on.

Who could have imagined that God's plan would have included the incarnation, crucifixion, and resurrection? But that's not the whole plan. It includes the new heavens and new earth (2 Peter 3:13).

And this is why St. Paul is able to write: "28 And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose." (Romans 8:28)

Regardless of our situation, we have a trustworthy God, and so we put our trust in Him.

St. Luke's is a congregation of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS). We believe that abortion is contrary to God's Word and "is not a moral option, except as a tragically unavoidable byproduct of medical procedures necessary to prevent the death of another human being, viz., the mother" (1979 Res. 3-02A).



This is a controversial topic in our society. Not many people enjoy controversy, but we are also aware that if we are not permitted to state what we believe, people will not know what we believe. With this in mind, I want to share with you over the next few of months how you might respond to pro-abortion arguments.

When someone says: "It's better to have an abortion if the child will have a disability," we could respond:

There are those who have come to believe that conditions such as Down syndrome are not compatible with life. This comes from a belief that people with disabilities are weak. This fear has no place in a world that stands for basic human rights. Instead of ending the lives of people who are different from us, let's celebrate their lives and their right to live up to their own unique, full potential. 67% of babies with Down syndrome are aborted in the United States – making this the most deadly form of discrimination. Let's embrace moms and dads who are choosing life for their babies who may be born with disabilitites, and let's band together, to focus on improving those lives – not preventing them.



# Mercy and Grace Lead to Generosity

"Thanks be to God for His inexpressible gift" (2 Cor. 9:15)! This is St. Paul's exclamation upon hearing the Corinthian church's response to the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and his request for support for the church in Jerusalem. The Christians in Corinth heard and received God's mercy in Christ, and they responded to St. Paul's call to support Christians in Jerusalem with a collection. The Corinthians' joy filled Jerusalem's need.

This is the reality of stewardship. Because of God's generosity in the giving of His Son to die on the cross for us, we are to be generous with all that we receive from Him. What do we receive? Everything. All that we are and all that we have is the Lord's. He is the creator and the giver. We are His creatures and those who receive what He gives.

It sounds easy. And it is. But then again it isn't. Stewardship is easy because it is God's work. Through what God gives, we give to others. Through what God gives, we support the work of the church for the life of the world. He gives; we receive. And like our generous Father in Heaven, we, as His children, use what He gives to us to love and serve others.

But stewardship is also difficult. That is because it goes against our natural inclination to think that what I have is mine to do what I want with. This is our sinful nature. It is our selfishness and our greed. How can we who have been given everything — life, food, clothing, house, home, forgiveness, divine sonship, an eternal inheritance — be so stingy with what we give to the church, the place where we hear about and receive all that God gives us and does for us? We are all guilty of this kind of thinking. And the only godly response is to repent and trust in the Gospel.

For if God has given you His own Son, will He not give you all things? Yes. He will. This is His sure and certain promise. God provides for His people. He provides everything we need for this body and life and for the life that is to come.

The church is a mercy place. It's a place where God's mercy in the death and resurrection of His Son, Jesus Christ, is given and received. For us who believe it means forgiveness, life and salvation in the face of sin, death and the power of the devil. Here in the church, we inhale God's mercy in Word and Sacrament, and exhale this same mercy in love and service to our neighbor. And that is an enduring, joyful thing to do. Our joy fills our neighbor's need because His joy filled ours (Heb. 12:2). Thanks be to God for His inexpressible gift!




