From The Pastor's Pen

For the rest of the world, October is about Halloween. But for Lutherans, October means that we remember and celebrate the **Reformation!** We remember that we are saved by grace alone through faith alone in Christ alone!

LUTHER'S ROSE

The most enduring symbol of the Lutheran Reformation is the seal that Luther himself designed to represent his theology. By the early 1520s, this seal begins to appear on the title page of Luther's works.

Here is how Luther himself explained its meaning:

First, there is a black cross in a heart that remains its natural color. This is to remind me that it is faith in the Crucified One that saves us. Anyone who believes from the heart will be justified (Romans 10:10). It is a black cross, which mortifies and causes pain, but it leaves the heart its natural color. It doesn't destroy nature, that is to say, it does not kill us but keeps us alive, for the just shall live by faith in the Crucified One (Romans 1:17). The heart should stand in the middle of a white rose. This is to show that faith gives joy, comfort, and peace—it puts the believer into a white, joyous rose. Faith does not give peace and joy like the world gives (John 14:27). This is why the rose must be white, not red. White is the color of the spirits and angels (cf. Matthew 28:3; John 20:12). This rose should stand in a sky-blue field, symbolizing that a joyful spirit and faith is a beginning of heavenly, future joy, which begins now, but is grasped in hope, not yet fully revealed. Around the field of blue is a golden ring to symbolize that blessedness in heaven lasts forever and has no end. Heavenly blessedness is exquisite, beyond all joy and better than any possessions, just as gold is the most valuable and precious metal.

Please join the **Circuit Reformation Service & Presentation** on Sunday, October 27, 2:00-4:30 p.m., at St. Paul Lutheran Church (330 Main St., in Alta Vista, KS 66834). The Presentation will be about the "Walkout" that occurred at Concordia Seminary in 1974. Rev. Dr. Daniel Harmelink, the Executive Director of Concordia Historical Institute, will be both the Preacher & Presenter.



This is a short synopsis.

On February 19, 1974 (fifty years ago) a majority of faculty and students walked off the campus of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, in protest of what they perceived as restrictive and backwards teaching about the Bible and God's Word. Dr. Harmelink will give a comprehensive presentation of the actual issues that surrounded the Walkout. The Walkout led to the formation of Christ Seminary-Seminex and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA).

The Walkout and the creation of Christ Seminary-Seminex were the culmination of theological conflicts that had been brewing for decades. Among these were strong disagreements about the relationship between the Gospel and Scripture, the historicity of biblical events and persons, methods of biblical interpretation, subscription to synodical confessional statements, guidelines for church fellowship, the uses of God's Law, and how the Christian mission is to be carried out.

"The Singing Church"

Lutherans have historically been called "the singing church." There is no doubt that music has been a major component in the theology and practice of the Lutheran church. Luther once remarked about music, "We can mention only one point, namely, that next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise." Music has a power and purpose that cannot be understated in our worship and the life of the congregation.

But music does more than touch the emotions. Music is a vehicle that carries both the musician and the hearer deeper into connection with the truth of the Scriptures. This is true of the most complex Bach chorale and even the simplest of songs like "Jesus Loves Me, This I Know." Each musical selection within the church shapes the thoughts, minds and faith of the people who experience them.

This is also true of stewardship hymns. We are currently considering the verses of "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (*LSB* 788) as it shapes our understanding and practice of stewardship. This month we take a deeper dive into verse two:

Teach us to thank you, Lord, for love and grace For life and vision, for a purpose clear, For Christ Your Son, and for each human face that shows Your message ever new and near.

The stanza begins by touching on the truth of the Law. Thankfulness is not a natural posture for fallen humanity. For sinners curved in upon themselves, thankfulness for love and grace is something that must be taught. We are those who hoard and clutch. Our confession of our shallow thankfulness highlights the need for us to learn thankfulness to God.

Thankfulness also points to what we are stewards of: love and grace! All the things we have traditionally called stewardship aren't actual stewardship. Rather, what matters is how we steward the one, true and only treasure: the love and grace of God revealed to us in the Gospel of Jesus Christ. So, all stewardship is stewardship of the Gospel! How can we gaze at the cross and empty tomb and not be thankful?

The LCMS defines stewardship as "the free and joyous activity of God's family — the church — in managing life's resources for His purposes." God's love and mercy give us a clear purpose as we live out our Baptism and practice this joyous stewardship. All we are, all we have entrusted to us, and all we are called to do is to connect others with the love and mercy of God revealed in Jesus!

The faithful steward sings with lips and life of this love and mercy that is ever new and near. In the Scriptures. In the Lord's House. At the Lord's Table. This is where our stewardship song starts and ends. Our family, our co-workers and classmates, and our world need to hear this song!

LANDSCAPE IMPROVEMENTS

In the past have you noticed the grass and trees on the east side of the church where the trees were dying and grass looks like weeds and bare spots. One tree was replaced and it is suffering near death. The problem was investigated and determined hard pack crushed concrete from construction which was found 2 inches deep in the bare areas, 4 inches deep in the weedy areas, and about 8 inches deep in the few places that grow grass. The tree roots and grass roots just did not have anywhere to go. The greener strip north of the transformer also has gravel below, but the gravel is looser which has allowed some success. Reseeding or new trees was going to be futile without digging out this hard pack gravel left form construction. With volunteers, volunteer equipment, some rental equipment and an over the top week of volunteering the week of September 16 the project was completed. No problems with rain, but unfortunately had some pretty hot days. Now we await God's help in grass growing.

The circle area also had the same hard pack concrete and in addition had the problem of rain flooding the area from the parking lot. A curb for the circle area is yet to be installed by contractors to keep rain drainage out and then the circle will be completed. No confirmation as of yet for when the contractor will install the curb

The volunteer help, equipment, and free top soil likely saved \$15,000 in cost. The total project including the curb should be in the range of \$5,000 which council has approved to be paid from Thrivent Choice dollars, some memorials, and some donations.



Note from Petagaye Pearson, AHG Troop Leader—




