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### From the Pastor's Pen

<sup>38</sup> And Peter said to them, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit.

– Acts 2:38

The events of Pentecost, as described in Acts 2, mark a significant moment in the early Christian church. Occurring fifty days after Easter, Pentecost was originally a Jewish festival celebrating the harvest and the giving of the Law at Sinai.

In Acts 2, the apostles were gathered in Jerusalem when suddenly a sound like a mighty rushing wind filled the house where they were sitting. This was accompanied by what appeared to be tongues of fire that rested on each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in various languages, enabling them to proclaim the wonders of God.

As the apostles spoke, a crowd gathered, consisting of devout Jews from various nations who were in Jerusalem for the festival. Each person heard the apostles speaking in their own native language, which astonished and bewildered them. Some in the crowd mocked the apostles, suggesting they were drunk.

Peter, empowered by the Holy Spirit, stood up to address the crowd. He explained that they were not drunk but were experiencing the fulfillment of the prophecy from Joel, which foretold the outpouring of the Spirit in the last days. Peter boldly proclaimed the message of Jesus Christ, emphasizing His death, resurrection, and the call to repentance and baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

The response was profound; about three thousand people accepted Peter's message, were baptized, and became part of the early church. This event not only marked the birth of the Christian church.

The connection of Pentecost to baptism is significant. Just as the Holy Spirit was given to the apostles, baptism today serves as a means through which the Holy Spirit delivers the forgiveness of sins. Through baptism, our own personal Pentecost, the Holy Spirit leaves us in no doubt. He comes to us through the concrete means of water and Word. That which Christ won for us on Calvary, the forgiveness of sins, is delivered to us. This delivery creates faith in Christ, which means entry into the family of God.

To celebrate Pentecost, please wear red to worship the weekend of June 7-8.

I was asked to write a devotion for our Lutheran Parish Nurses International ministry group and I thought our St Luke's family might enjoy it! W

John 17:13-23 ESV

Life on this side of Heaven is hard. Satan works every day to hurt and divide people. It seems to me that most of Satan's destructive work happens within the realm of relationships: family relationships, working relationships, church relationships, etc. I believe the most hurtful wounds people carry in their lives occurred within the context of relationships. The enormity of these relational wounds seems to be moving our world from a mindset of community toward a mindset of isolation and protectionism. How much of our daily activities and interactions with others are shaped by the desire to protect ourselves?

Brothers and sisters this is not good. God has created us to be in community. To work, serve, and live in relationships. In relationship with God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit and with one another.

At the same time, this work of Satan is not new. John records Jesus' prayer to His Father in John chapter 17. Jesus asks His Father to "protect them from the evil one" and "to sanctify them in truth" and "to make us one." The very opposite of the work of Satan.

Our Triune God has answered this prayer! He protects us, He sanctifies us, and makes us one through His Word and Sacraments. It is through God's Word that He sanctifies our thoughts, our words, and our deeds. Regular remembrance of our Baptism and participation in the Lord's Supper unites us together with Him. A regular diet of God's Word and Sacraments nourishes our souls just as a regular diet of fresh food nourishes our bodies. As nurses, you see what a diet of poor or little food does to the body. This is also true for our souls! Relationships are not healthy because souls are not healthy! When bodies AND souls are nourished, we can walk in, around, and through relationships with God's grace, hope, and love. The Lord's grace, hope, and love builds relationships of community in Him and takes down the walls of isolation and protectionism. The Lord's grace, hope, and love lets the world know that He loves them.

May God nourish us through His Word and His Sacrament so we can be His hope, His grace, and His love in our relationships and our communities for their benefit and His glory! Amen!

# LCMS Stewardship Ministry Newsletter

#### Rooted in Christ, Growing in Stewardship

The heartland is now awash in various hues of green. The doldrums of winter give way to the colors of spring. Now, the promise of spring gives way to the growth of summer. Fields are planted and sprouted. Gardens are planted. Flowers adorn the beds of neighborhood homes and roadside ditches. Green is the shade of life!

Green growth is also the hue of the faithful steward. The seed of faith planted in human hearts in the waters of Holy Baptism grows as it is nurtured in the Word proclaimed and ingested in the Holy Supper. This faith does indeed save. But our stewardship of the Gospel is also designed to bear fruit for God's glory and the benefit of our neighbor.

To consider this, let us look at the hymn, "Fruitful Trees, the Spirits Sowing" (LSB 691). It is very much a stewardship hymn!

Fruitful trees, the Spirit's sowing, May we ripen and increase, Fruit to life eternal growing, rich in love and joy and peace.

- The tree of faith is not planted in us by us. It is the Spirit's work! We do not claim the title
  "steward." Rather, we are created for it (Gen. 1:26–28).
- He is the One who makes it grow in us. The fruits of the Spirit are borne out because we, by grace through faith, are connected to the vine that is Jesus (John 15).

Laden branches freely bearing Gifts the Giver loves to bless; Here is fruit that grows by sharing, Patience, kindness, gentleness.

- Our stewardship is NOT about what we do. It is about what the Holy Spirit does in and through us. That is the fruit that we bear. His fruit for His purposes.
- But that fruit is lived out through us. The world sees the fruit of our stewardship of the Gospel in lives lived connected to Word and Sacrament.

Rooted deep in Christ our Master, Christ our pattern and our goal, Teach us, as the years fly faster, Goodness, faith, and self-control.

- Stewards have been created and redeemed to reflect the image of Jesus in the world. He is the pattern. We reflect to others around us the Light of the Gospel He has shone on us.
- This reflection comes when Christ's goodness flows from us to others.

Fruitful trees, the Spirit's tending, May we grow till harvests cease; Till we taste, in life unending, Heaven's love and joy and peace.

- Just as the Spirit has created us for stewardship of the Gospel, so also does He cause our faithfulness! He calls, gathers, enlightens, sanctifies and KEEPS us in this faithful stewardship of the Gospel.
- The ultimate goal of our faithful stewardship is eternity. For us. For our neighbor. All worked out by the Spirit.

Green is the color of the world right now. It is also the color of our stewardship and it is growing in us as we are connected to the vine, Jesus! God grant our growth in Him!

It doesn't matter who you are but whose you are. People's worth is often judged by their abilities or appearance. Psalm 139, though, reminds us that every life has value. We were created by God, not just existing by chance. He formed each of us with purpose and care, and this truth challenges us to see the sanctity of life in every individual, from the unborn to those with disabilities to those who are adopted or in foster care. All of us are loved by God.

When the rights of the unborn are debated and denied, Psalm 139 declares, "For you formed my inward parts; you knitted me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are your works; my soul knows it very well." This verse reminds us that every unborn child is not just a group of cells but a unique individual cared for by God. This truth helps us understand that life, no matter how small, is sacred and deserves protection.

People with disabilities also reflect the truth that every life is fearfully and wonderfully made. Society often overlooks and underestimates those with physical or mental challenges, but Genesis 1:27 proclaims that "God created man in his own image," regardless of ability. Disabilities do not lessen a person's worth. Instead, they highlight the beauty of God's diverse creation, reminding us that every person has a purpose in His plan. God created us to help and serve each other and to build each other up.

Children in adoption or foster care systems may not have earthly parents to support them, but they share the same Heavenly Father that we do. Children in these situations may have faced difficult beginnings, but Psalm 139 shows us that God has a purpose for each child, no matter their past. Adoption offers these children the chance to be part of a loving family that sees them as valuable.

When we are faced with issues like abortion, disabilities, and adoption, we can stand firm in knowing that every person is a beautiful creation of God, fearfully and wonderfully made.
