From the Pastor's Pen

On the western outskirts of Manhattan, Kansas, a city that offers a unique blend of small-town charm and collegiate vibrancy, St. Luke's Lutheran Church stood as a beacon of hope and community, faithfully using Scripture to enable and equip its people to share Jesus Christ's love with those around them.

At the weekend services on a warm June day, Pastor Schmidt's message focused on God's nurturing love and the joy that comes from being part of His family. He highlighted Isaiah 66:13. He pointed out that comfort for God's people comes through his church. Comfort is not a vague feeling or disembodied hope. Comfort is God's presence in this world through his people, gathered around his means of grace and speaking the truth of his Word to one another. The congregation felt invigorated, eager to put their faith into action.

That Sunday afternoon, the members of St. Luke's gathered for a picnic. They brought food to share. Some brought salads or side-dishes. Others brought desserts. (There were always plenty of desserts at these events.) The youth who would be attending the national Youth Gathering in July cooked and served hamburgers and hotdogs. They also provided activities and games for everyone to enjoy. Conversations and laughter flowed for several hours. They embodied the spirit of community.

At the event, several folks made plans to be the "hands of Christ" to care for those who are struggling. They hope to focus on the shut-ins, the recently hospitalized, and those who recently lost a loved one. Others chatted about getting involved in Flint Hills Lutherans for Life. It is their desire to encourage others to be "for life" from conception to grave.

The next day, a group met at a local restaurant and reflected on Galatians 6:1–10. They discussed how they could bear one another's burdens and support each other in their daily lives. They shared stories of faith and encouragement, reminding one another that they were called to serve, not just within the church but in the broader community.

On Monday night, Trail Life and AHG met at the same time. The devotion that evening was from Luke 10:1-20. They heard about the 72 disciples being sent out into the world to proclaim the Kingdom of God through their love and service.

The members of St. Luke's Lutheran Church know they not only make a difference in the lives of others but that they also have a solid faith in Christ. Through the Word and Sacrament, they were reminded of God's unwavering love in Christ, empowering them to continue living out their faith in joyful service. The bonds of community had grown stronger, and the transformative power of God's love was evident in every heart.

- I had a regular devotional schedule and now I find myself grabbing it "when I have a moment." It's been done; but not done well. That is not the mindset I want to have!

- I was spending time with Tricia and Spencer (usually a morning or evening walk) and now it's an end of the day, last minute, "I guess I should do this" kind of thing. Not the heart that I want to put forth toward the ones I love the most. I want to do better.

I am willing to bet I am not the only one feeling this way or having experienced this. I also believe that our faith, our habits, and our lives are fundamentally tied together.

I am being transparent to you, my brothers and sisters in Christ, so that you can encourage me OR join me this month in restoring healthy habits into our lives for God's glory and to the benefit of those God has placed around us.

This reminds me of Paul's analogy of his walk of faith and an athlete in the games:

1 Corinthians 9:24 Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one receives the
prize? So run that you may obtain it. Every athlete exercises self-control in all things. They do it to
receive a perishable wreath, but we an imperishable. So I do not run aimlessly; I do not box as
one beating the air. But I discipline my body and keep it under control, lest after preaching to
others I myself should be disqualified.

I am also reminded of the many Biblical references to the concept of Mutual Encouragement:

- 1 Thessalonians 5:4-28: A great encouragement for all of us!
- 2 Corinthians 1:3-11: The cycle of encouragement: God's to us and ours to others

Let's make July the launch pad of some fresh starts and new beginnings for God's glory and the benefit of those He has placed around us!

LUTHERANS FOR LIFE

Romans 5:8 "But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." That "us" is all inclusive. It's you and me. It's the child being passed from one foster home to another. It is the child with a disability. The person in the nursing home who is bed-ridden. And, the unwanted baby in the womb. God loves each and everyone one of us. He values each of us.

When it comes to you and me, do we go 'off script' when talking about life issues? We attend church, we sing the songs and pray the prayers. Then there's the BUT! In other words, are we not "for" life when it doesn't suit our situation? Or, maybe when it affects a family member, or someone close to us. How can we not value human life when God does?

Aren't you thrilled and grateful that God doesn't just pick "some" to love and die for. I know I am! He picks ALL!

LCMS STEWARDSHIP

Faithfulness: The Stewardship Standard

"Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found faithful" (1 Cor. 4:2).

What is the standard to which a steward is held? Ask the average person, and they might talk about percentages, tithes, and commitments. Too often, the default mode of measuring stewards is by how much and how frequently they give. This is not helpful. Measuring activity without any connection to baptismal identity is a recipe for disaster. It can either breed a sense of superiority and self-righteousness or create a culture of scarcity and despair. Neither outcome is godly or helpful.

This is not to say that stewardship should be regarded as "no big deal." St. Paul, within his discussion of the ministry to which he has been called, sets the standard of accountability for the steward: faithfulness. This removes any sense of superiority or self-righteousness and dispels scarcity and despair. When a steward manages what the Lord has entrusted to them — resources and all aspects of life — for God's purposes, the focus is not on how much or how frequently they give.

LCMS STEWARDSHIP CONT.

This standard reflects the stewardship portrayed in the Gospels where Jesus entrusts varying amounts, each according to ability. The commended stewards were recognized for their faithfulness in their vocation, not the amounts they managed. Conversely, the condemned stewards were not castigated for their lack of performance but for their lack of faithfulness.

What does this mean for the steward in the pew? The Lord has entrusted you with various things. Luther captures them in his explanation of the First Article of the Apostles' Creed and the Fourth Petition of the Lord's Prayer. The familiar couplets of food and drink, house and home, spouse and children, land, animals and all possessions are the Lord's, and He has entrusted them to you for His purpose. This trust brings an active realization of thanksgiving.

This active thanksgiving is our stewardship. It can be distilled into two questions that the steward regularly needs to answer:

- 1. How has God blessed me?
- 2. How is He calling me to respond?

The first question is quite simple to answer: if the Lord has entrusted something to you, it is a blessing. This blessing is for God's glory and the benefit of your neighbor. The second question is more challenging to measure; it is not about percentages and charts. Instead, it is about a life of thanksgiving that flows from the mercies of God revealed in Jesus Christ. This thanksgiving starts at and flows from the cross and the empty tomb. Our stewardship of the Gospel drives our stewardship of everything else.

The standard, then, is faithfulness. Faithfulness flows from eyes focused on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith. It does not come from our efforts but through the working of the Holy Spirit in our lives, through Word and Sacrament. It begins at the altar in the Divine Service but extends into the world — from hearth and home to workplace and classroom, from commerce to leisure. The mercy of God, freely given in Jesus, leads us to demonstrate a faithfulness that reveals to others the same mercy we have received in Jesus.

This faithfulness cannot be measured empirically. It is simply allowing the Holy Spirit to work in and through us for the glory of God and the benefit of our neighbor. Weekly. Daily. Faithfully.

TREASURER REPORT

In May the church had \$33,549 in income and \$39,113 in expenses. The ELC netted \$5,496 bringing a net loss for the month to \$68. Net income for the year is \$97,7680, this includes \$43,316 raised for Phase II. Total saved for Phase II is \$154,842.
