From the Pastor's Pen

Welcome to fall! October turned a little chillier. And now it's November. Trees are looking bare. Jackets and sweaters will be part of our daily attire.

So what's happening at church life?

On Saturday, November 1, buy candy at $\frac{1}{2}$ price at the stores. Any donated candy will be stapled to church invitations that will be distributed during the Christmas Parade.

November 1 is All Saints' Day. We will observe this festival day at church on November 1-2. Lutherans confess that all who are baptized and trust in Christ are made holy through His righteousness alone, not their own good works. All Saints' Day celebrates the truth that in Jesus Christ, every believer is both sinner and saint—simul justus et peccator—saved entirely by grace. Living Christians and those who have died in Christ are part of the "communion of saints."

On November 1 & 2, we will have white on the altar, symbolizing the victory of Christ and the purity of those redeemed by His blood. We will also include in worship the reading of names of members who have died in the past year. We will remember that they now rest in the Church Triumphant. Hymns such as "For All the Saints" and Scripture readings from Revelation 7 and Matthew 5 remind worshipers of the heavenly hope shared by all believers.

November 7-8 is the Kansas District Lutheran Women in Mission Christian Life Retreat at the Hilton Garden Inn and Convention Center in Salina, KS. This year's speaker will be Donna Snow. Ladies, prayerfully consider joining other mission-minded ladies for a relaxing weekend of connecting with old friends and meeting new ones as they stand Unshaken on the ROCK.

On November 9, the Church Children will sing in church at 8:30 a.m., and the Early Learning Center Children will sing in church at the 11:00 a.m. Please go out of your way to greet and welcome people who are not regulars in worship.

On Sunday, November 16, we will set up for the Thanksgiving Dinner at 3:00 p.m. Once the chairs and tables are in place, we will attach the candy to the Christmas invites that will be passed out at the Christmas parade. The Thanksgiving meal will begin at 5:00 p.m. You are invited to bring a salad, side-dish, or dessert. Don't miss this opportunity to interact with your church family. We are so grateful for our cook, Bonita Tegtmeier.

Sunday, November 23, is the Last Sunday of the Church Year. On this day, we focus on the end of the world. Christians look forward to this day. On this day, everyone will see Jesus. Everyone who has died will be raised from the dead. The bodies of those who are alive will be transformed to glorified bodies. All Christians will meet the Lord in the air – our ascension day. In the old Lutheran Liturgy Service Book, you could find a service called "The Festival of Harvest." It was placed right next to the Reformation service and for that reason, I think it generally was skipped over. However, I have always felt it was so fitting for this time of year in our Midwest communities and in our calendars. This is a season (month) for giving thanks!

The collect for "The Festival of Harvest" service was this:

Almighty God, most merciful Father, who openest Thine hand and satisfies the desire of every living thing, we give thee most humble and hearty thanks that Thou hast crowned the fields with thy blessing and hast permitted us once more to gather in the fruits of the earth; and we beseech Thee to bless and protect the living seed of Thy Word sown in our hearts that in the plenteous fruits of righteousness we may always present to Thee an acceptable thankoffering; through Jesus Christ, Thy Son, our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end.

And the gradual for the service was this:

and satisfies the desire of every living thing. Hallelujah! Hallelujah!

Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless His Holy name:

LCMS STEWARDSHIP

Pointing to the Rock of Ages

Not the labor of my hands Can fulfill Thy Law's demands; Could my zeal no respite know, Could my tears forever flow, All for sin could not atone; Thou must save, and Thou alone. (LSB 761:2)

While the classic hymn "Rock of Ages" shows up in the Lutheran Service Book in the "Hope and Comfort" section, it can also teach us a valuable lesson about Christian stewardship. If that surprises you, stay with me on this one.

No Lutheran would ever dispute the fact that our work does not save us. Ephesians 2 makes it truly clear that we are dead in our trespasses and sins and would remain in that state until Christ raises us by grace. There is not a ladder on which we can climb out of the grave that our sins have dug for us. No blood, sweat nor tears will be able to rescue us. We all know this.

Our works do not save. Christ's work on the cross of Calvary does! He bore human flesh. He carried the burden of our sin to the cross. His body was beaten, bruised and bloodied for us. He has indeed atoned for us! This is more than enough reason for this hymn to be bouncing around in your head all day today!

But our work has a place. The place is in response to what the Father has done for us in Jesus. The Rock of Ages, who is Jesus, becomes the foundation on which our lives of faith are built. The Holy Spirit uses the means of grace to make us God's workmanship that Paul talks about in Ephesians 2:10.

Our workmanship does not display our power or prowess. Like the heavens declare the handiwork of the Creator, the works of a redeemed sinner point others to the salvation that is worked only by Jesus alone. Our work is a response to and reflection of a grace and glory that we ourselves could never accomplish or achieve.

We become stewards of the treasure that is the Gospel. When we faithfully support the work of the Gospel of Jesus Christ with our financial support, we are doing the work which points to the One who alone atones. When we come alongside a struggling sister or brother for whom Christ died and we share the stewardship work of compassion and care, we enflesh the treasure of God's love and redemption. When we make it a weekly priority to arrange our schedule to be in the Lord's House with other stewards of the Gospel to receive again and again the Gospel's precious gift, we are stewards of the Body of Christ in the congregation that points even more people to Jesus.

We cannot do this. Jesus does it through us. We are simply stewards of this precious treasure!
